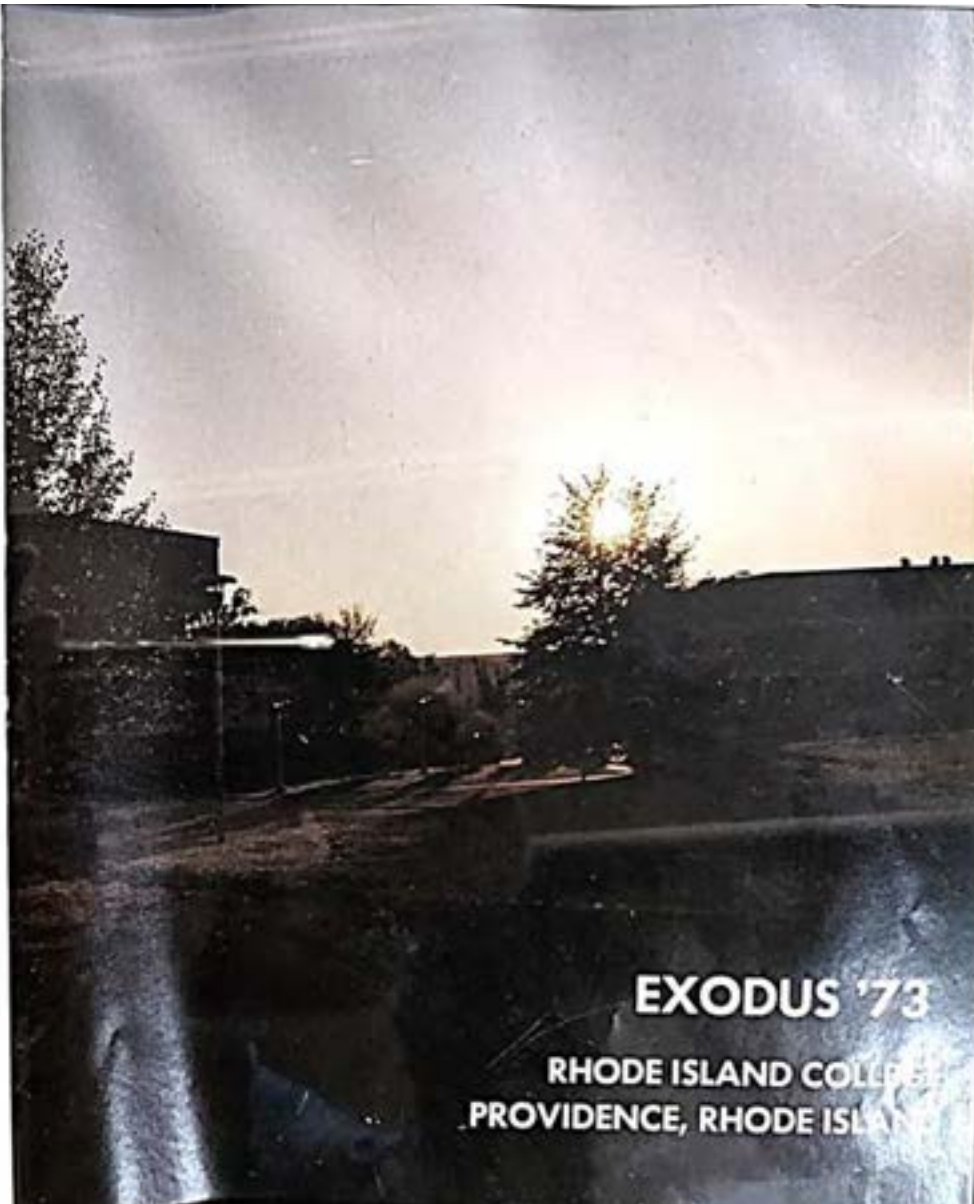
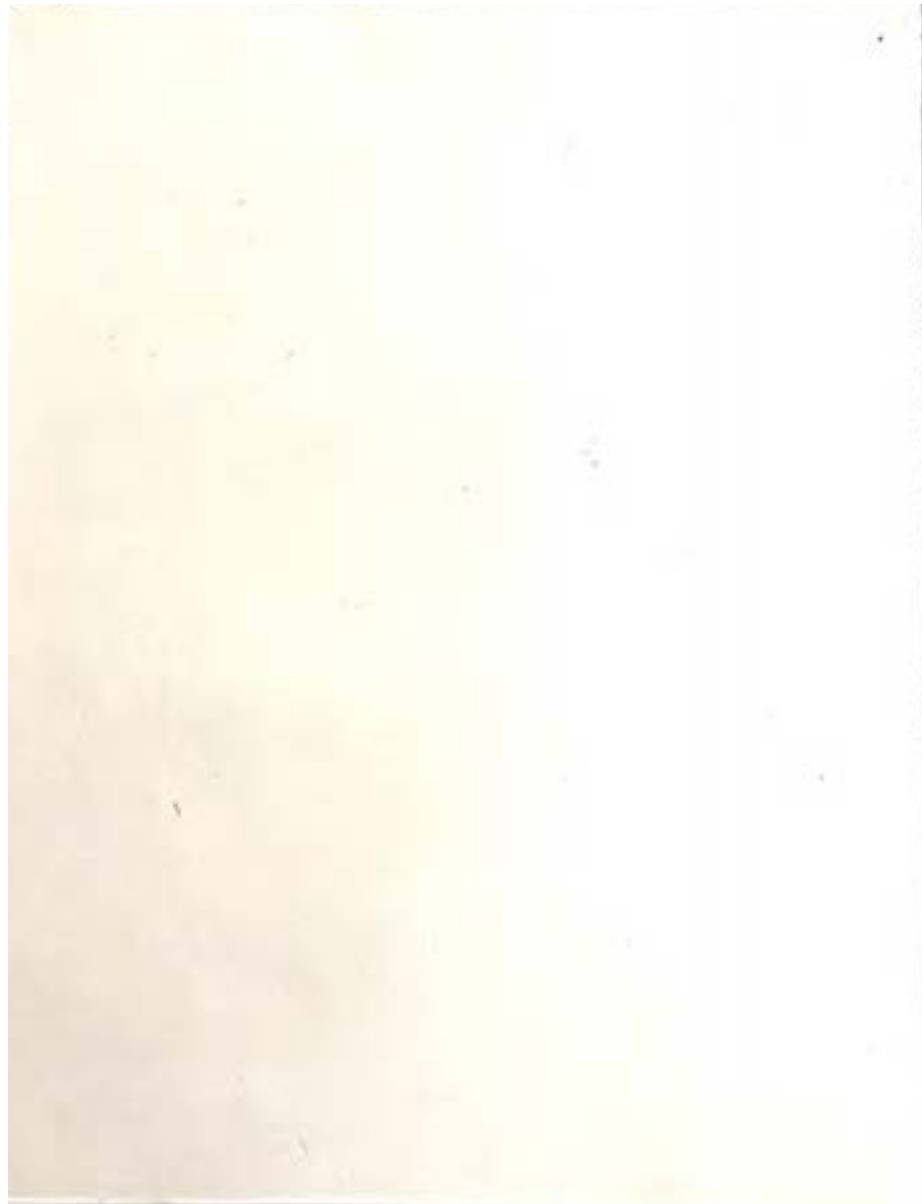
Four years later in 1973, we developed our Senior Yearbook – Exodus II, to record the experiences of our final year at RIC.

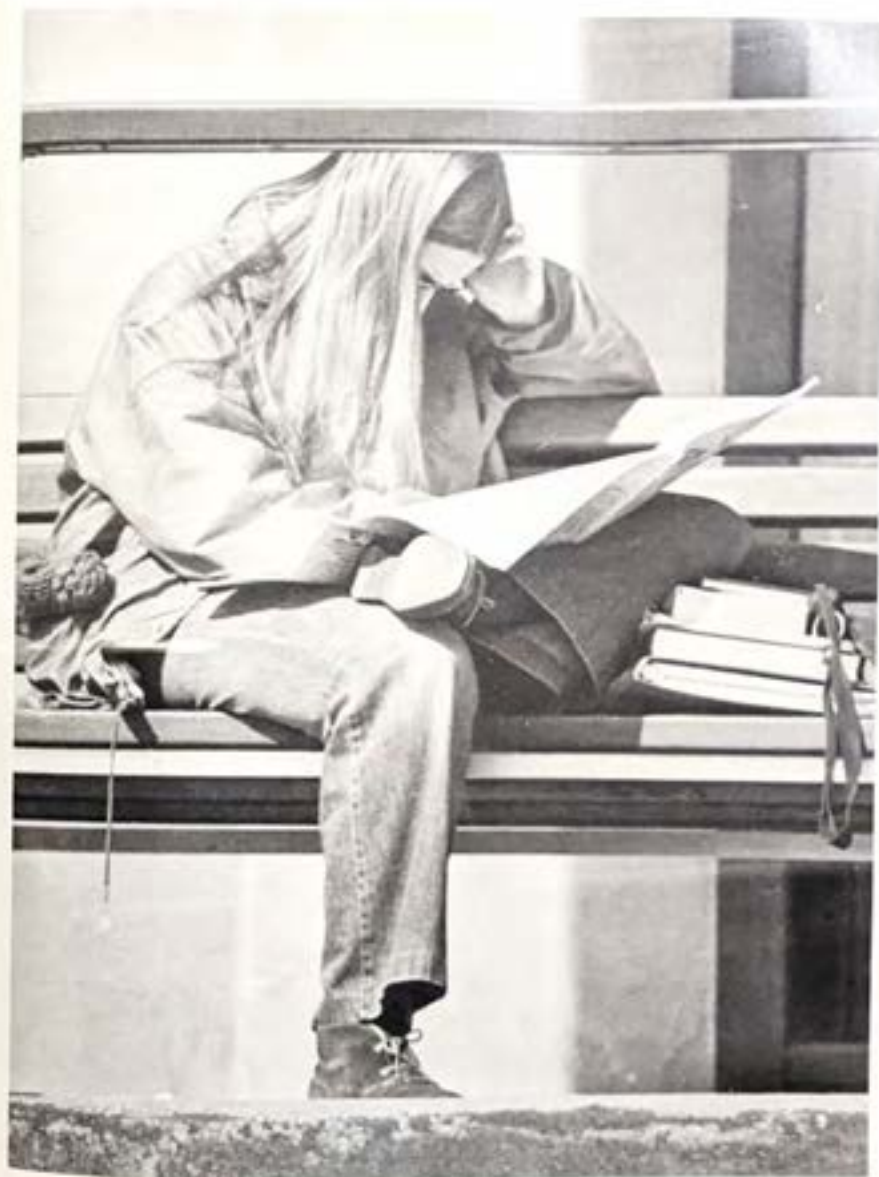
Rhode Island College introduced us to dance and song, the arts and theater. We filled our days with learning and made the campus our personal space.

Athletics

For so many, Rhode Island College provided the opportunity to participate in collegiate, intramural and recreational sports. Whether you competed or went to athletic events or just read about the results in the Anchor, the college provided the opportunity to develop yourself intellectually, socially, emotionally and physically.

Rhode Island College had soccer, not football, and many sports from basketball to baseball, wrestling and track. Some were more successful than others. RIC never had a pool, so the Class of 1973 decided to raise funds for a North Providence pool as its senior gift to the college.



SOCCKER

"Improvement" was the Key Word

Led by the Coach Ed Bogda, Captain's Trophy Winner Dale Seward, and Captains Frank Tedino and Gene Bescetta, the 1972 Rhode Island College Soccer Team posted its best record in twelve years. Seven wins, six losses, and one tie (7-6-1) made the key word for this year's team "improvement."

Although losing to Keene State on October 25, by a 7-0 rout, the Anchormen themselves were not without big wins. Leading team scorers Dale Seward, Orlando Andrade, Steve Mattola, Frank Tedino, Charlie Arent, and Chester Jackson, always had their hands in a RIC victory. A team does not win, however, on offense alone and that is where back Gene Bescetta, a three time all conference man, and Jimmy White, the goalie, came in. Gene Bescetta seemed always to be there whenever a play needed breaking up. Jimmy White, an outstanding junior from Bristol, R. I., posted three shut-outs and held NCAA power, Providence College to just one goal. Also adding much, however, to team spirit, hard work and dedication in all areas was Charlie Marchand.

The highlight of the season came on October 21, when everyone put it all together for a 2-1 victory over Johnson State College. The significance of this win was great. For one thing it showed that the team was better than what their record was. Second, it pointed out that Coach Bogda and the Anchormen were no longer to be taken lightly by any New England power.

Underclassmen gaining much experience were Charles Arent, Charlie Cheves, Julio Tavares, Chester Jackson, and Mike Lannon. Julio Tavares showed much quickness on the field and Mike Lannon while substituting for Jimmy White in the goal for half a game, helped produce a shut-out.

Because of his role as a team leader and a fine player, Dale Seward was awarded the Captain's trophy at the annual fall sport's banquet.

Next year's job as captain will fall upon the shoulders of Jimmy White and Steve Camargo.

Basketball Season Comes to Disappointing End

The Rhode Island College basketball team completed its season on February 22 with a loss to the Braves of Quinnipiac College. The final record of the season read 8 wins, 14 losses.

To say the least, the season was a disappointment. This team had more ability than the record indicates, more games could have been won but the fact remains, 14 of 22 games were lost. What happened? This was, without a doubt, a season riddled with inconsistency. Early in the season, the team defeated a tough Boston State team, later in the season they were routed by that very same team. Keene State, another fine ballclub, handed the Anchormen a crushing defeat early in the season. Keene posed no problem for the Anchormen in their second meeting of the season. The teams from Connecticut gave AIC a lot of trouble. Eastern Connecticut handed the Anchormen two extremely disappointing defeats. New Haven, Central Connecticut and Quinnipiac also came away with victories.

The Southern trip was another story. Although the team lost all three of its games, they played fine basketball. Facing tenth-ranked Southwestern Louisiana seemed like a mismatch, but the Anchormen played good basketball throughout most of the game, only to lose. Corpus Christi also defeated RIC. But the best game came against Pan American University. In this contest, the Anchormen lost by one point. They didn't win, but they did prove that they have the ability to play ball.

The trip did seem to do the team some good. It is the opinion of this reporter that their confidence was given a lift, that the team felt that they could defeat their "regular" opponents after performing so well against such formidable foes as Southwestern Louisiana and Corpus Christi.

Upon their return they handily defeated Babson and played a fine game in their victory over Fitchburg. It seemed as though they had gotten over their losing ways, until the second Boston State game. The end of the season was a repeat of the beginning.

It is difficult to write about a losing team, or to put it more truthfully, a team with a losing record. What can you say? Well, it wasn't all bad. There were some fine moments, certain victories which will be remembered; and losses which will easily be forgotten.



Baseball is a game in which the unexpected comes to be expected. The 1973 RIC baseball team was an antithesis of this theory. Going into the campaign everyone connected with the team figured the season to be a very fruitful one and produce, perhaps, a champion. This as we all know was not the case as the Stenmen as they are affectionately referred to, posted a horrible 4-16 record. The season started off with a ten inning 3-2 loss to Nasson College. The one run loss typified the type of season that RIC was about to suffer through. Game two saw the Anchormen fall to Lowell St. by one run 7-6. In that game the Anchormen trailed at one point 6-1 but rallied in the late innings to come back and tie the game at 6 all. Then with two out in the bottom of the ninth Lowell won on a bloop single to left. The trend continued for five more games until Jim White turned the trick on Bryant College 2-1 and RIC finally had a victory. In the next game against Barrington College to show you the absurdity that is baseball, RIC pounded out 32 hits and came away with an amazing 27-1 victory. The club's record at this point was 2-7 but that did not last. Things unfortunately got back to normal and the breaks continued to go against RIC for seven straight games until they once again trimmed Bryant. This time more convincingly, 8-4. The Anchormen then dropped their last home game to Bently by a score of 8-7, another one run job and closed out the season by splitting a twin bill against Westfield.

The season on a whole was not considered a success but a team as young and talented as this one will get the breaks next year we hope and when it does with the added maturity, look out world here come the Stenmen.



WRESTLING

The 1972-73 wrestling season saw the Anchormen, under Coach Russell Carlsten, drop to a 6-9 record but finish within the top twenty teams in New England for the first time in RIC history. Although team morale was high, the team lacked depth. Because of losing Steve Tobia (118 lbs.), the Anchormen were forced to forfeit at least one weight class every meet. Painful injuries to unlimited wrestler Dave Brown, bothered the team even further.

Six wins for the Anchormen came with victories over Brandeis twice, Tufts, Emerson, Holy Cross, and Towson. Always scoring high and leading the team towards victory were Kenny Bolton, a junior who led the team in total points, Joe Capone with the best seasonal record, and Rich Di Gennaro with the most wins on the team. Larry Roberti who was wrestling for the first time, led the team in pins and provided much inspiration with his hard work and dedication. Freshmen Mike Henault and Rich Duguay gained much valuable experience as well as finishing with winning records. Much credit also belongs with Coach Carlsten. Besides giving the wrestlers much needed advice on moves and strategy, every day Rusty would do the workout with the team as well.

The wrestling team's hard work paid off during the New England Championships. Jimmy Patalano who finished fourth in the MIT Christmas Tournament, placed fifth at 136 lbs. giving RIC nine big points. Rich DiGennaro, Joe Capone, and Rich Duguay also scored giving the Anchormen a total of 16 points — good enough for 19th place in New England.

A good sign for next season is that all members of the team will be returning, as no one will be lost to graduation.

CROSS COUNTRY

Although, not one team victory was recorded, the 1972 Rhode Island College cross country team had some promising individual performances. The brightest of those was by Freshman Ray Danforth who finished third in a meet against Eastern Conn. and Bryant College. Ray's hard work and dedication was unmatched along with his time of 27 minutes on the Franklin Park Cross Country Course — the best time ever for a RIC freshman.

Senior and Captain, Tom Kenwood helped provide the strong 1-2-3 punch along with Sophomore Jim Gallagher who had two triangular meet victories.

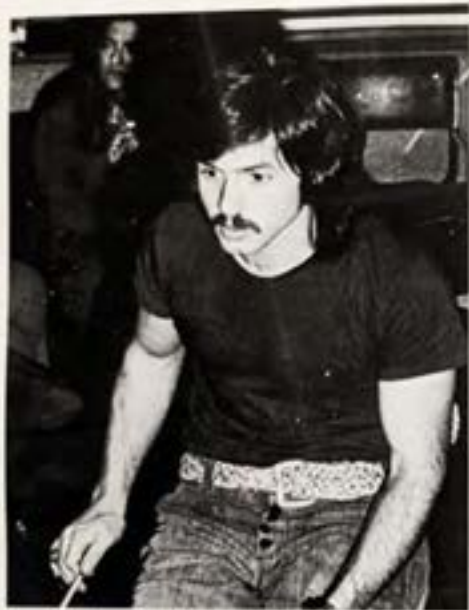
Joe Abbatte, Dan Spinner, and John Gallucci came out for cross country for their first time and displayed forms of improvement over the last month of the season.

On November 14, Ray Danforth and Jim Gallagher along with Coach Ray Hanlon traveled by jet to Wheaton, Illinois where they participated in the NCAA College Division Championship. Although both RIC runners fell off the early pace and were never in the running, much valuable experience was gained in this meet. Out of a field of 550, Jim placed in the 193rd spot while Ray came in at 391st.

In dual meet competition, lack of depth and a lack of strong fourth and fifth men plagued the Anchormen all season. Against Bryant and Eastern Conn. State the team placed men in first, third, and fifth, but were still unable to pull out a victory as the fourth and fifth men were too far back. This problem should be overcome, however, as recruiting by Coach Hanlon will make up the difference for the 1973 season.

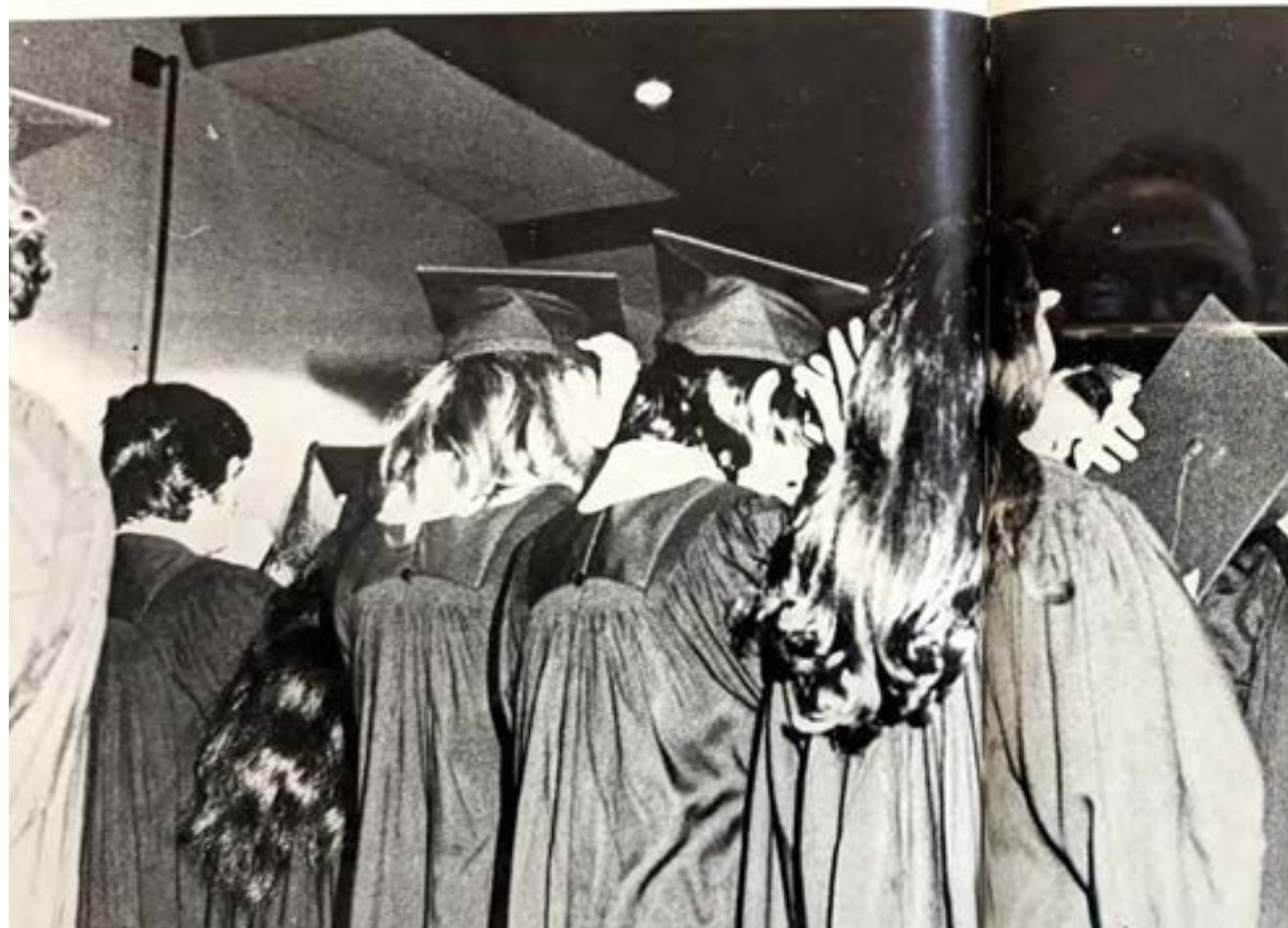

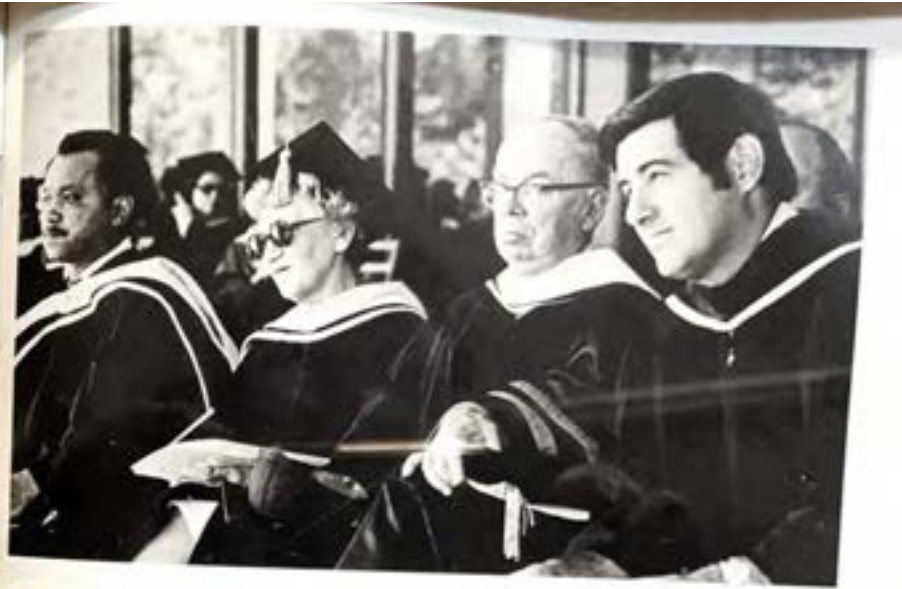

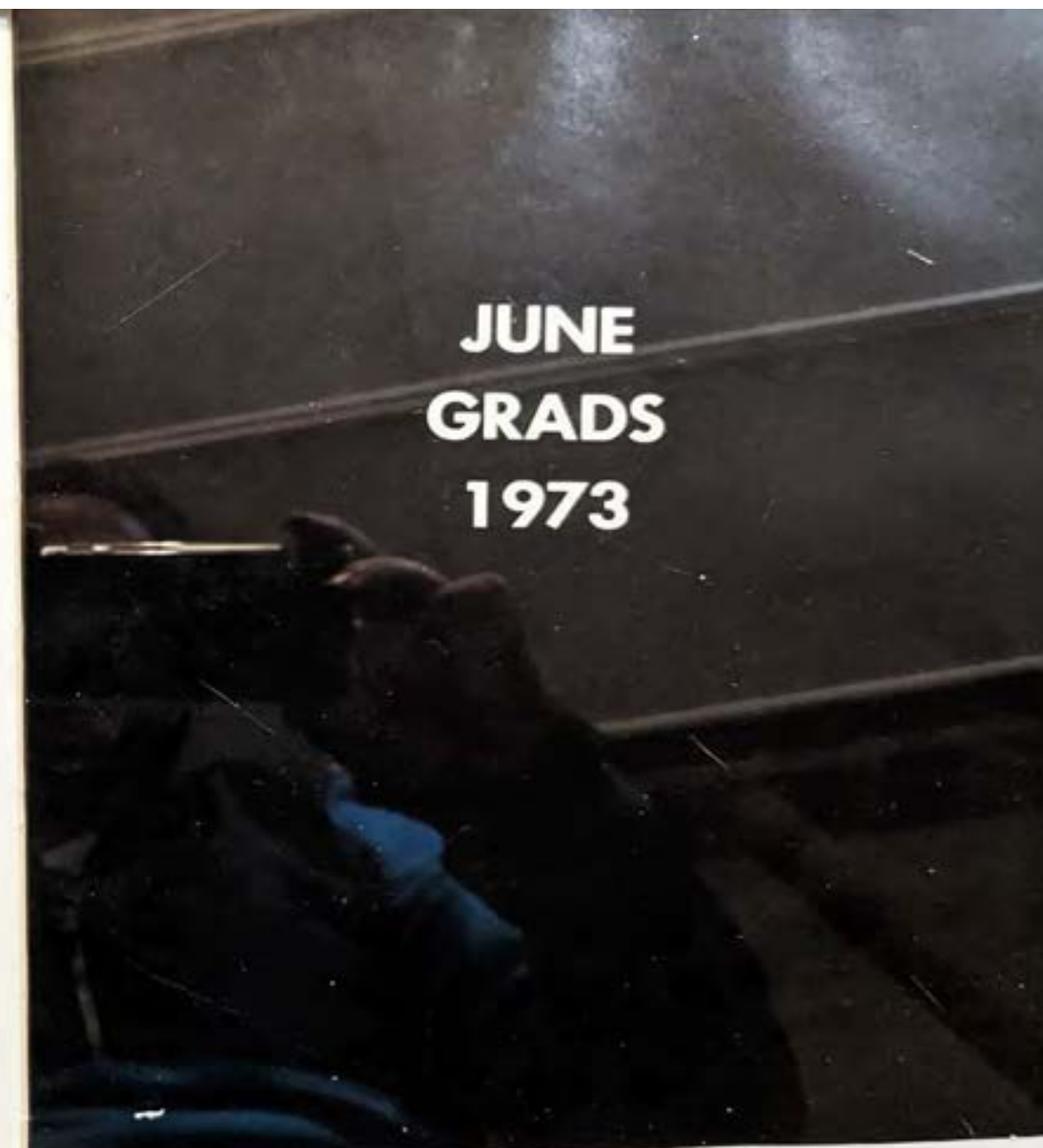

It was our first year at college – a time of learning and growing.

We faced the draft and a time of unrest and protests. And then we learned that college students protesting at Kent State were killed.

At colleges across the nation and at RIC, students took action to demand a stop to the war and armed responses to protest and free speech.

Rhode Island College would close classes for the remainder of the semester; and students raised their voices across the nation.

THE MAKING OF REVOLUTIONARIES

As the minutes to midnight ticked away, the protesters—some bearded and almost all dressed or wrapped in an odd assortment of shirts, jackets, blankets, and sleeping bags—burst into song. First, they sang the old civil rights standard, "We Shall Overcome." Then they sang into "America the Beautiful."

The phrase—"and crown the good with brotherhood"—was hanging in the air as the Federal officials moved in and toward the front of the protesters, a girl clad in a bright orange shirt.

STRIKE

Demanding an end to U.S. involvement in Southeast Asia, protesting the Kent State Massacre, and joining together against all political and racial oppression: A majority of R.I.C. students decided that "business as usual" must not continue at the college.

A majority of R.I.C. students for the first time had meaningful communication with other students.

A majority of R.I.C. students began to think about things more important than fraternity and class weekends.

A majority of R.I.C. students finally became aware of situations and conditions that they previously had ignored.

Worrying about final exams, hoping for faculty and administrative approval of the student strike, and trying to find the easy way out, 1700 people attended a meeting May 10, 1970 after which—

Many R.I.C. students capped out.

Many R.I.C. students found comfort in their apathy.

Many R.I.C. students alienated themselves by going to classes.

Many R.I.C. students showed themselves as the hypocritical, blind, biggest people they were all along.

I am in favor of the strike only so far as it is an individual's response to the situations in Cambodia and Kent State University. I do not agree with the trend towards school shut down because it eliminates an individual's right to act as he believes. By the time a student becomes a member of a college campus, hopefully he is mature enough to decide how to act when confronted with a question such as the strike. He should decide and act upon his decision. He may strike but decide not to attend workshops. He may decide to act in other ways that show his involvement. He may canvass. He may pass out literature related to the strike. He may work with an organization not involved with campus activities. If he decides to attend classes, his decision should be respected and he should not be referred to as a "cop out". None of us actually knows who is copping out, but some people claim to know and tag people randomly. Such name calling is only another example of a lack of understanding and an inability to accept other people as they are and for what they believe.
